DISCERNMENT OF GIFTS

DEAR FRIEND,

If you attend Sunday Mass regularly, you will have heard the parable of the talents (Matthew 25:14-30). In it, Jesus tells how a wealthy man, on the point of taking a trip, entrusts his property to three stewards: five talents to the first, two talents to the second, one talent to the third. The first two exploit these large sums during the absence of the owner, so that on his return they can give him back twice what he had entrusted to them. But the third, out of fear, only buries his talent to preserve it without making it bear fruit. Obviously the owner is deeply disappointed in his decision and rebukes his servant, reminding him that he could at least have invested it in the bank in order to generate a little interest on the capital.

Typically, the homily you hear on the day of this reading invites you to recognize the talents that God has entrusted to you and to share them with others, both inside and outside the Christian community. Perhaps the homilist points out connections with the passage from the first letter to the Corinthians (12:7), where Saint Paul teaches that the Holy Spirit distributes charisms or gifts among Christians in order to build the Body of Christ, the Church. It may be that in listening to this teaching, you said to yourself. "But I have no particular talent, I don't have any charism of the Holy Spirit. I'm an ordinary person, in what way can this parable of Jesus concern me? How can this teaching of Saint Paul apply to me?"

The document you have in hand has one purpose only: to help you discover and identify what might be your talent, your charism. It is a very simple tool - you just have to evaluate the relevance of forty statements, compile the results and think about it a little. Maybe it will help you see how the Word of God applies to you, and to what service or commitment the Lord is calling you.

Obviously, every tool has its limits, and this one is no exception. It is not very scientific, some distinctions are debatable and the questionnaire itself could probably be improved. Above all, you should not feel boxed in by the result of the exercise, as if you only had the talents identified by your score. That being said, this exercise can help you think about your capacities, strengths and abilities. Above all, it can help you get involved where you would find the most interest and joy. That's important!

So, welcome to the discernment of spiritual gifts. Have fun answering the questions, but think hard about what they reveal about you. You will find your place in building up a more vibrant Christian community and a more beautiful world!

SCORING GRID

For each set of three questions, write on the following lines the number (either 0, 1, 2, 3 or 4) that you circled for each one. Add them up and enter the total on the last line. For example, if you circled 2, 4 and 3 for questions 1, 21 and 41 in the "administration" category, write these results on the respective lines, add 2 + 4 + 3 for a total of 9 and enter 9 on the last line.

The most obvious gifts will usually have a total of 7 or more. If you have more than one gift with a total of 7 or more, all these gifts can serve to

identify a 'cluster of gifts'. Notice how each gift in the cluster can complement and support the others. Each of the gifts in such a cluster should be developed in order to properly identify your charism.

This inventory will help you discover and free your gifts. Remember that this is not a scientific instrument. Your perceptions will be validated by others and confirmed in prayer and by their use over time.

1. PRAYER:

Seek the help of the Holy Spirit to evaluate your gifts.

2. THE STUDY:

Familiarize yourself with the definitions of the various gifts and suggestions for commitment offered for each gift. This will give you a solid foundation to identify your own gifts.

3. PERSONAL REFLECTION:

Identify the feelings associated with each gift in your cluster. By reviewing the proposed commitment suggested for each gift, ask yourself how you would feel in exercising the various types of ministries corresponding to gift in your cluster. The exercise of your gifts should be a source of joy for you.

NOTE YOUR RESULTS.

By exercising your spiritual gifts, be attentive to the results produced by your efforts. Using your gifts should yield positive results in your community and around you.

PAY ATTENTION TO AFFIRMATION.

Be aware of the affirmation you receive from members of your family, your friends and members of your community. They will acknowledge and confirm your gifts by their congratulations and their expressions of gratitude for a job well done.

EXERCISE YOUR GIFTS.

All Christians must work together and support one another, recognizing the diversity of gifts. Our gifts allow us to be better prepared and equipped than others to serve in particular areas. Those who serve in areas for which they have received a gift will be more efficient and joyful than when they engage in areas for which they have not received a gift.

SUGGESTED AREAS OF INVOLVEMENT CORRESPONDING TO EACH GIFT

In what kind of service will you be most effective? The following examples are presented as a starting point and should not be considered as an exhaustive list. You can use it to begin exploring ways to exercise your gifts in the service of your parish and community.

ADMINISTRATION:

Parish pastoral council, finance committee, fabrique assembly, coordinator of catechesis, parish coordinator, chief financial officer, team leader.

ARTISTRY:

Making of banners, theatre club, puppetry, video and audio productions, photography, crafts, decor team, design team.

DISCERNMENT:

Parish pastoral council, long-term planning team, social action team, peer counselling, facilitator of a support group.

EVANGELIZATION:

Reception of new parishioners, evangelization committee, communication and publicity, parish visitation.

EXHORTATION:

Peer-ministry team, visiting hospitals, homes or institutions, ministry by phone, peer counselling, small group facilitator.

FAITH:

Chair of parish pastoral council, long-term planning team, leader of Bible study group, teaching.

GENEROSITY:

Fundraising, stewardship team, volunteer coordination, personal witnessing.

HOSPITALITY:

Ministry of welcoming, sponsorship of new parishioners, host for home Bible study group, reception or information centre, meal service, catering during fellowship meetings.

INTERCESSION:

Prayer chain, prayer partner, family prayers, praise and worship services, healing Masses.

KNOWLEDGE:

Coordinator of the library or parish resource centre, nomination committee, long-term planning team, parish pastoral council.

LEADERSHIP:

Coordinator of catechesis, chairing committees of all kinds, coordinator of social activities, coordinator of a summer Bible school, chair of the parish pastoral council, speaker at special events.

MERCY:

Home visits, visits to hospitals and other institutions, transportation to parish activities, social action team, head of the support team, telephone ministry.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC:

Orchestra member, accompanist of the choir, music for special events, organist, music programs during various activities.

VOCAL MUSIC:

Parish choir, vocal ensemble, leader of son for the children's liturgy of the Word, liturgical animator.

PASTORING:

Facilitator of home Bible study groups, outreach to new parishioners, counselling for youth or adults, animation of small faith teams, telephone ministry.

SERVICE:

Computer data entry, gathering news for the parish bulletin, sound system technician, liturgy recording, caring for children, maintenance of buildings or grounds, cleaning of the kitchen, transportation.

MANUAL SKILLS:

Maintenance and cleaning of buildings, electrician, mason, plumber, maintenance and mechanical repair, oper-

ation and repair of audio-visual system, computer maintenance, webmaster.

TEACHING:

Animation of a Bible study group for adults, liturgy of the Word for children, catechesis for adolescents, lecturer, leader of extracurricular activities for young people.

WISDOM:

Long-term planning team, parish pastoral council, peer counselling, leader of a support group, peer support team.

WRITING:

Author of articles for the parish bulletin, publisher of the parish bulletin, webmaster, public relations, advertising committee, letter writing.
